Defense Production Act of 1950

- President contracts that promote national defense take priority over all other contracts
- E.O. 13603 delegated to
 - Dept. of Agriculture-food, plant, livestock
 - Dept. of Energy-energy
 - Dept. of Health & Human Services-health
 - Dept. of Transportation-civil transportation
 - Dept. of Defense (Army Corps of Engin.)-water
 - **Dept of Commerce-EVERYTHING ELSE**



E.O. 13603

Federal Priorities and Allocations System (FPAS)

- Agriculture Priorities and Allocation System-USDA (ALPAS) - 7 CFR Part 789
- Energy Priorities and Allocation System-DOE (EPAS) 10 CFR Part 217
- Health Resource Priorities and Allocation System-HHS (HRPAS) - 45 CFR Part 101
- Transportation Priorities and Allocation System-DOT (TPAS) – 49 CFR Part 33
- Defense Priorities and Allocation System-DOC (DPAS) –
 15 CFR Part 700



E.O. 13603

Federal Priorities and Allocation System (FPAS)

6 Authorized agencies may redelegate to other agencies – materials, services and facilities deemed necessary by

- DoD & related to military production, construction & use
- DOE & related to energy production, distribution, & use
- DHS & related to other national defense civilian defense, continuity of government

DPAS Regulations

15 CFR 700

- Administered by DoC's Bureau of Industry and Security
- Schedule I Delegate agencies & their programs
 - Department of Defense
 - Department of Energy
 - Department of Commerce
 - Department of Homeland Security
 - General Services Administration
- Priority Ratings



How The Priority Ratings Work

Two Parts To A Priority Rating

- Rating Symbol
- Program Identification



How The Priority Ratings Work

Two Rating Symbols

- DX
- **DO**

Priority Levels

- DX Orders = DX Orders
- DX Orders > DO Orders
- DO Orders = DO Orders
- DO Orders>Unrated Orders



How The Priority Ratings Work Program Identification – Schedule I

Program identification symbol	Approved program	Agency(ies)
A1	Aircraft	Department of Defense.
A2	Missiles	Department of Defense.
A3	Ships	Department of Defense.
A4	Tank - Automotive	Department of Defense.
A5	Weapons	Department of Defense.
A6	Ammunition	Department of Defense.
A7	Electronic and communications equipment	Department of Defense.

Example – radar equipment: DX-A7 or DO-A7



4 Requirements For All Rated Orders

- Priority symbol & program identification
- Required delivery date
- Written signature or digital signature or name
- Statement(s) "This is a rated order certified for national defense use and you are required to follow all provisions of the Defense Priorities and Allocations System regulations."
 - Emergency preparedness "This is a rated order for the purpose or emergency preparedness. It must be accepted or rejected within [time limit]."



Acceptance and Rejection of Rated Orders

Mandatory Acceptance

- Must accept any rated order not subject to optional or mandatory rejection – even if already have unrated orders
- Cannot discriminate against rated orders



Acceptance and Rejection of Rated Orders

Optional Rejection

- Ordering entity won't meet regular terms
- Item/service not supplied by contractor
- Item used but not sold in last 2 years but if sold must accept order up to amount sold
- Ordering entity makes item/performs service
- Would violate Dept. of Commerce rule



Acceptance and Rejection of Rated Orders

Mandatory Rejection

- Unable to fill order by delivery date
- DO Order will interfere with DO/DX Order
- DX Order will interfere with DX Order
- Equally rated orders received on same date accept fillable orders based on delivery date, reject others

If any of these apply – must offer to accept earliest delivery date possible



Acceptance and Rejection of Rated Orders

Deadlines For Notifying Customer In Writing

- DO Order within 15 working days
- DX Order within 10 working days
- Emergency preparedness within time specified in order but
 - If existing hazard should have at least 6 hours
 - If imminent hazard should have at least 12 hours

**All rejections must state the reasons for the rejection



Placing Rated Orders

Contractors that receive rated orders

 MUST place rated orders with suppliers for items needed to fill the rated order

Absent an exception, priority ratings must be the same along the supply chain

Contractors can only place priority ratings if they

- Receive a rated order; or
- Are authorized by DoC or Delegate Agency; or
- Are otherwise permitted by DPAS regulations



Preferential Scheduling

Contractors that receive rated orders

 MUST schedule operations – including acquisition of items needed – to satisfy on time

When necessary, rated orders must be given preference in order of their priority and over unrated orders

• Even if this requires diversion of items processed or ready to be delivered against unrated orders



Special Priorities Assistance

Criteria for request – must be

- Timely
- For an item urgently needed
- Made after reasonable effort to solve problem

Examples

- Difficulty getting timely delivery
- Cannot find supplier
- Resolve production/delivery order conflicts



Legal Issues

Liability Protection

• Contractor will not be liable for act or failure to act because of compliance with DPAS

Willful violation of DPA or DPAS

• Is a crime – fine, imprisonment or both
